



Winter is coming

Now that the cooler weather has arrived, please make sure your jumper is labelled with your child's name. We have a mountain of lost jackets and jumpers already.

Take home folders

Great to see students returning their 'Take home folders' so they can be issued a new word list. Teachers will be making sure students can read and spell words before issuing the next list. Please be patient as some days we have no-one to assess and others we have several.

Home Readers

Our new home readers(decodables) have arrived at school. We are just waiting for them to be stamped and then we will be issuing them to students who are still learning the code of reading.

These books may look a little different to ones your child may have brought home in the past as we have a new English K-2 syllabus that now has a focus on teaching through a synthetic phonics approach.

The home readers are decodable. That means that the book is designed so that students must follow the sounds and say the word. There should be no guessing with decodable readers. They read every letter/sound and blend them together. The more children read words with the phonics/ spelling focus taught in class, the more they internalise what those sounds look like when they are written, and this improves their spelling.





Each book will have a set of 'Letter Sounds' and 'Tricky Words' (see photo below) that students should be able to read. As usual it is a good idea to ask your child what the book may be about and what they know about the topic. Maybe they have had a personal experience like the book – discuss that. At the end of the book ask your child to retell the book in their own words.

Re-reading throughout the week is important to improve fluency.



What are decodable books and why are they important?

For children to become successful readers they must be able to crack the alphabetic code through a systematic synthetic phonics approach. This approach has proven time and time again as the most effective way to teach reading and is backed by research. If children can't decode the words on a page they will fail in their journey to access text.

Children must be explicitly taught knowledge of letters and sounds and the skills of sounding out and blending. But this is not enough to know how to read. The knowledge and skills must be practised over and over to achieve mastery. Without decodable readers, this practice cannot take place.

Decodable readers are the conduit between phonics and reading. Children need them to build the necessary skills so they become proficient readers and can access the limitless opportunities of skilled reading.





National Walk Safety to School Day (WSTSD) is on Friday 20 May 2022. Now in its 23rd year, the annual campaign encourages all primary school children, their parents and carers to walk safety and regularly to school.

The event seeks to promote road safety, health, public transport and the environment.

Australian children are becoming less active. One substantial contributor is the decline in walking and/or taking public transport to school. Children who are regularly physically active are healthier, perform better academically and are less likely to be obese or overweight. Sedentary behaviour can lead to long-term and costly risks of illnesses such as heart disease and diabetes.

Walking regularly is the best exercise because you can build it into your daily routine.







The objectives of National Walk Safely to School Day are:

- To encourage parents and carers to walk regularly with their children, all or part of the way to school
- To promote the health benefits of walking and create regular walking habits
- . To help children develop vital road crossing skills and ensure children up to the age of 10 years hold an adult's hand when crossing the road
- To reduce car dependency and traffic congestion, especially around schools
- To reduce the level of air pollution created by motor vehicles
- To promote the use of public transport.
